The Born-Alive Abortion Survivors Protection Act (H.R. 619) has again been introduced in Congress to protect babies from infanticide.

But efforts to bring the bill to a vote in the House are being blocked. Your action is needed to urge your Representative to sign a discharge petition that would allow this vote to occur.

Some states have passed laws to expand abortion and to repeal laws providing specific protections for babies born alive after surviving an attempted abortion. The Born-Alive Act would provide these specific protections nationwide to help prevent newborns from being killed or left alone to die.

We must continue to push Congress to pass the Born-Alive Act, so babies born alive following an abortion attempt are treated the same as any other newborn baby. **PLEASE ACT TODAY!!!**

A word from Fr. Bill.....

Dear Parishioners:

One of the tools for prayer which a Spiritual Director once suggested to me was to regularly reflect on generosity, forgiveness, patience and hope.

I would like to share with you some of the fruits of the prayer this week on generosity.

I am very grateful to our parish staff. I often say that I would not be able to do any one of their jobs. I wouldn't be able to clean, cook, direct music (I have been asked not to sing when the microphone is on), do all the accounting procedures, oversee all the day to day activities in the parish (including coordinating the parish website and all the related technology), build anything and deal with all the vendors, oversee all the building projects, or oversee all the details of 60-70 weddings a year, especially in the climate of the pandemic when many weddings got postponed (sometimes twice) and a few got cancelled. I am so grateful to each member of our staff. When I came to St. Augustine Parish in 2014, Jacob's and Bob's jobs were part time. Now, there are not enough hours in the week for them to do all they need to do.

I am very grateful to the members of our Parish Pastoral Council, Parish Finance Commission, and the Steering Committee of our Capital Campaign. Their consultation and advice have been invaluable on things like how to handle the pandemic, suggestions for celebrating the 225th anniversary of the parish, suggestions for observing the year dedicated to St. Joseph, overseeing the parish budget, suggestions for allocation of funds and fundraisers, suggestions on capital improvements, helping to move from Phase 1 to Phase 2 in the Capital Campaign, helping to facilitate applications for grants, and obtain a 501(c)(3) status. They all have been extremely faithful to monthly Zoom meetings. I, by far, have not named everything on which I have consulted with these groups.

I am grateful to our parishioners who enhance our liturgies, especially our music ministers, lectors and Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion. I am grateful to those who collaborated with me in the 2-part series on the Sacraments which our parish provided for the entire Archdiocese of Philadelphia during Advent and Lent. We are very fortunate to have parishioners who faithfully sanitize our pews after each Sunday Mass and those who oversee the environment of the church. I am grateful for the financial generosity of our parishioners during the pandemic. The offertory collection is comparable to last year and the use of electronic giving has increased substantially. This generosity has been extraordinary. It has allowed us to keep up with our bills.

I am grateful for those who helped us stay connected during the pandemic with things like helping us purchase the equipment to livestream our Masses, saying the rosary together each Tuesday, sharing insights each Thursday concerning the scriptures for the Sunday readings, participating each Friday of Lent in the Stations of the Cross, participating in the prayer service on Good Friday on the Seven Last Words, participating last Summer and Fall in the discussions on the US Bishops Pastoral Letter on Racism, and the Pope's encyclical on Fraternity and Social Friendship.

A highlight for me is always working with those in the process of the initiation of adults to the Church (RCIA). The commitment of those involved each week for nine months is extraordinary. We saw the fruits of this last Sunday at the 7 PM Mass when one person who was baptized Lutheran professed his faith to the Catholic Church.

I am grateful to my Augustinian brothers who are not technically assigned to minister at St. Augustine Parish but who are very willing to help with our liturgies and who are willing to be sounding boards for me in so many ways.

The suggestion to regularly bring the concepts of generosity, forgiveness, patience and hope to prayer was very valuable. It helps to keep things in perspective, especially in this time of the pandemic.
