Each Sunday, after the 11:00 AM Mass there is a novena in honor of the Santo Niño.


9th Annual Archdiocesan Men's Spirituality Conference Man Up Philly • March 4, 2017

A Biographical Sketch of an Augustinian Saint......

Blessed Christine of Spoleto, Augustinian Laywoman ◆ February 13th

Agostina Camozzi was the daughter of a well-known doctor in Osteno in the Italian province of Como. At an early age she married a stonecutter, but he died shortly afterwards. She later became the mistress of a soldier and a son was born to them, but the child did not live long. She then married again, this time to a farmer from Mariana in the diocese of Mantua. But he met his death at the hands of a jealous rival, who in turn was killed for the crime, or perhaps for some other reason. After that Agostina decided to reform her way of life, and so moved to Verona, where she became and Augustinian Tertiary. She took the new name of Christine, her one wish now being to imitate Christ, the only physician who could bring balm to her troubled spirit. Her life of penance took many forms, and her prayer and works of nercy increased daily. In the years that followed she lived in various Augustinian convents, leaving one for another, when the sisters of the former began to treat her with special reverence. On February 13, 1458, she died, with the reputation for great holiness and many miracles. Her remains are preserved in the former Augustinian church of Saint Nicholas in Spoleto.

A word from Fr. Bill....

Dear Parishioners:

For the past several years we have had about 25 parishioners who have served meals at The Gift of Life Family House which is a residence for those having transplants of any kind (liver, kidney, heart, etc.) and their families. We have served two meals a month, one on a Sunday and the other on a Tuesday. Families really appreciate having a home cooked meal after spending a day at the hospital. This has been possible because of the generosity of you, our parishioners. There has been a second collection on the 3rd Sunday of each month to support this ministry of our parish. This money has paid for the food which is served. Our parishioners shop for the food, prepare it and serve it.

You have been so generous with this collection that so we have been able to save enough money to support this ministry for the next several years. Consequently, after consultation with the volunteers at Gift of Life, the Parish Pastoral Council and the Parish Finance Commission, even though our ministry at Gift of Life will absolutely continue, the second collection on the third Sunday of the month will no longer be generated for Gift of Life. It will be targeted for "Parish Fellowship and Community Outreach." It is purposeful that this is a general title. It will support parish activities that bring us together as a community as well as being able to reach out beyond ourselves to others. As we do with all of our finances, we will keep you informed how the money from this collection is allocated.

Lent begins two weeks from this Wednesday, March 1st. As a heads up, we are going to ask all the members of our community during Lent to reflect on how we care for "Our Common Home" as Pope Francis calls our environment. We are going to provide a number of suggestions for all of us to consider in which we can be involved during Lent to help our environment. In his encyclical, Pope Francis says, "Living our vocation to be protectors of God's handiwork is essential to a life of virtue; it is not an optional or a secondary aspect of our Christian experience." He also says that it is small things that help "Our Common Home," things like turning off lights, using less gas, using less water, becoming more educated about the topic, joining others in a common project, etc. We will be hearing more about this as Lent gets closer and during Lent.

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A Biographical Sketch of an Augustinian Saint.......

Blessed Simon of Cascia, Priest ◆ February 16th

Simon was born in Cascia, Italy, toward the end of the 13th Century, of the distinguished Fidati family. Initially, he dedicated his energies to the study of the natural sciences, but with a change of heart decided to embrace religious life and to pursue the science of holiness. He entered the Augustinian Order at about the age of 20, and following his formation and studies, became an outstanding preacher and a master of the spiritual life in



Italy. His book, The Works of Our Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ, gained a wide readership during the Middle Ages, and his letters reveal his gift as an expert spiritual director. Combined with his acute insights and persuasive style as a preacher, was his love of simplicity and humility in religious life. He refused all honors and titles offered to him, and preferred nothing more than to live a life of contemplation in solitude. Equally persuaded of the importance of obedience, however, he continued to use his gifts in the direct service of others. Simon died in Florence on February 2, 1348, a victim of the pestilence which was devastating Europe at the time. Gregory XVI confirmed his cult in 1833. His remains are now venerated in Basilica of Saint Rita in Cascia.
