A word from Fr. Bill....

Dear Parishioners:

In the past several months, our lives in the parish, in our homes, in our city, and in deed everywhere have changed drastically. We didn't have public Masses for several months. Since we have started public Masses, there are no hymnals, no presentation of gifts (bread and wine), no Eucharist under both species (bread and wine), no choirs, limited singing, no touching one another at the sign of peace, no passing the basket for the collection, far fewer people at Mass, no socials after Mass, pews are being sanitized after each Mass, weddings are being rescheduled, no meetings in person, baptisms outside of Mass, etc.

We have seen incredible differences in our contact with families. Some of my friends have told me the hardest thing for them in the pandemic has not being able to see their grandchildren in the ways they always did. They long just to hug them. Obviously, the way we are learning (often virtually) and the way we are working (often at home) have changed tremendously. I could go on and on.

What has stayed the same? I would answer, God's presence with us and the goodness in others have consistently been present.

Throughout salvation history, going back to the Israelites going thru the desert, to the crucifixion of Jesus, to all the wars, to the depression, and to the scandals in the Church, God has always been with us. Jesus told us he would be with us "all the days of our lives." He told us he would "not leave us orphan." He told us he would give his Spirit to us so that we could have wisdom (the first reading this weekend speaks of wisdom), knowledge, understanding, courage, fortitude, piety and hope. God is present in our midst, even in the midst of the pandemic.

Another constant is the goodness of others. We see it throughout the First Testament in the lives of the prophets who spoke and acted heroically for God. We see it at its peak in the life of Jesus and his selfless giving of himself for us. We have seen it in martyrs, and in modern day, we see it in men and women who have stood up for justice, goodness and who have walked humbly with God.

We see these men and women today in the midst of the pandemic in the doctors, nurses, first responders, scientists dedicating themselves to the development of vaccines, teachers who work so hard that students can get an education either virtually, or with wearing masks and practice physical distancing, in the person who helps us with our bags at the supermarket, and closer to home, we see it with many of our parishioners sharing their presence, time, gifts and talents with us. I am sure you could add to this list of how you have seen the goodness in others in these past months.

On Monday of this past week, I received an email from a young married woman who said she just moved into the neighborhood and only for several months but she was wondering how she could volunteer in the parish. She suggested maybe cleaning, gardening, cooking or buying food for someone who might need that. On Wednesday we made arrangements for some things in which she can be involved.

Where is God in the middle of this pandemic. As he promised that he would never leave us, he walks with us and is in our midst. God is in the goodness of countless men, women and children who are serving us directly and indirectly.

May we keep our eyes open this week and see God in the midst of the pandemic.
