## A word from Fr. Bill....

Dear Parishioners:

It seems every day we hear of mass killings from somewhere around the world. Someone does not like gay people. So, it is OK to kill them. Someone lost his job. So, it is OK to kill the disabled. Someone does not like a certain ethnic group. So, it is rationalized to kill them. Someone wants to retaliate against police officers, so it is "open season" against them. A priest has his throat slashed as he is celebrating Mass in France. We don't know the motivation, but we could speculate.

How have we gotten to this point in our society? It may seem obvious and simplistic, but I think we have gotten here because of an increasing lack of respect for human life.

I think we all believe that we as human beings have an integral relationship with God but when we stop thinking about that, we can lose the perspective and allow violence to become a natural part of our lives and that of our society.

Pope St. John Paul often spoke of "The Culture of Death." It seems worse in more recent times. We are less and less valuing the dignity and worth of human life. Cardinal Bernadine often talked about the "seamless garment," meaning the respect of all life at every stage in life. That human life includes the child in the womb, the marginalized in society, the aged, the imprisoned, those physically and psychologically challenged, those on death row, and the people with whom we live, work and with whom we interact regularly.

We can come up with excuses like it is OK to have legalized abortion because it might be better to kill the child in the womb rather than have an unwanted child, a handicapped child, or have back alley abortions. It is better to kill the person on death row rather than having to pay for his/her food and legal expenses as he/she sits in a prison for many years. We can rationalize anything. But the reality is we are talking about human beings, made in the image and likeness of God. "What you do the least of my people, you do to me."

I think this mentality happens because, maybe not in as dramatic ways, we ourselves do not respect as much as we should the lives of others with whom we encounter on a regular basis. Maybe we do not like a person, so we do not say hello or we ignore the person in a group conversation. Do we have any idea how much this might kill that person's spirit? Maybe we are looking to go up the corporate ladder, so we gossip about someone else's weaknesses or sensitivities. Do we have any idea what this can do to a person's self-worth? Maybe we do not want to see someone in particular be liked by others, so we do not give any encouragement to the person's initiatives. Do we have any idea what that does to that person's self-confidence? There are many examples of how easy it is for each of us in our daily lives not to respect the dignity and worth of each other, each made in the image and likeness of God. 'What you do to the least of my people, you do to me."

We certainly are not the ones who killed the gay people in the Florida pub, nor the police officers in Dallas, nor the young man in Baton Rouge, nor slashed the priest's throat in France, nor killed the travelers in Turkey or England. But, have we been violent by killing or slashing the spirit, self-worth, or confidence of someone we know?

We have sung often the familiar hymn, "Let there be peace on earth, and let it begin with me." Maybe we could sing, "Let there be greater respect of all of God's people, and let it begin with me."
