

**Laetare Sunday** is the fourth Sunday in the season of Lent, in the Western Christian liturgical calendar. Traditionally, this Sunday has been a day of celebration, within the austere period of Lent. This Sunday gets its name from the first few words (incipit) of the traditional Latin entrance (Introit) for the Mass of the day. "Laetare Jerusalem" ("Rejoice, O Jerusalem") is Latin from the Book of Isaiah. The term "Laetare Sunday" is used by most Roman Catholic Churches. The word comes from the Latin *laetare*, the singular imperative of laetari: "to rejoice."

"Rejoice, Jerusalem, and all who love her. Be joyful, all who were in mourning; exult and be satisfied at her consoling breast."

In Roman Catholic churches, flowers may appear on the altar and the organ may be played as a solo instrument. Priests are given the option to wear rose-colored vestments at Mass held on this day in place of the violet vestments normally worn during Lent. The term "rose" is used to describe this lighter shade of the color violet in the Roman Rite. Sunday is considered a day of relaxation from normal Lenten rigors; a day of hope with Easter at last within sight.



# A word from Fr. Bill...

#### Dear Parishioners:

I mentioned in my letter last week that Ted Baker, our Candidate for full communion with the Church, will participate during Lent in the "Three Scrutinies" which are part of the RCIA process: last Sunday at the 7 PM Mass, this Sunday at the 11:00 AM Mass and next Sunday at the 9:00 AM Mass. As I said last week, when we scrutinize something we look at it carefully and thoroughly. This means when we scrutinize ourselves we sincerely examine ourselves as to what we are doing well and be honest with ourselves of what we can do better.

I mentioned that in the spirit of Lent, it should not be just Ted who scrutinizes himself, but all of us should be looking at ourselves thoroughly and carefully as we prepare to celebrate the Resurrection of Jesus and renew our baptism promises. I suggested we scrutinize ourselves in the context of the three traditional disciplines of Lent: prayer, fasting and almsgiving. Last week, I shared some thoughts to help examine our prayer life. This week we will look at how we fast and next week look at almsgiving.

The history of fasting in the terms of spirituality is rooted in the Old Testament. The idea was that fasting made one's prayer more acceptable to God. It was a way of demonstrating one's level of commitment before the Lord. In the New Testament, we know that Jesus fasted for 40 days and 40 nights. He also was questioned about why the apostles didn't fast and his response was you don't fast when the bridegroom is still with you, in other words in time of joy. So, there is a time to fast and a time not too fast.

As we know, the forty days of Lent are an imitation of Jesus' time in the desert. Fasting was not for Jesus, nor should it be for us, an end in itself. It is spiritually healthy at times to "long" for something. We always don't have to have all of our longings met. Also, fasting is appropriate at a time we prepare for something significant. Jesus was preparing to begin his public ministry. In Lent, we are preparing to celebrate Jesus' Resurrection and to recommit ourselves to him.

As I scrutinize myself concerning the spirituality of fasting in my own life, it is healthy to look at several things. Do I fast only in following the letter of the law? For example, Catholics are too fast from eating meat on the Fridays of Lent. So on a Friday in Lent, I don't eat meat but I have a lobster dinner, I am following the letter of the law, but I am not following the spirit or purpose of the law. I say I am not going to drink coffee in Lent or smoke in Lent, but if I don't drink coffee or smoke anyway, I am obviously not giving anything up. Again, am I disciplining myself in order "to long" for something? This is difficult when we live in a first world country and all our needs and conveniences are generally met instantaneously.

Sometimes we hear people say they are not going to "give anything up" in Lent but just do something positive for Lent. Jesus did a lot of positive things, but he still fasted. Our spirituality is not that it is one or the other, but it is both. Obviously, we should do good things, but there are positive elements knowing my needs are not always met and I depend on God.

Again, fasting is not an end in itself. If I give up beer for Lent, what do I do with the money I have saved, fatten my bank account or give it to the poor? (Thus the Rice Bowls) If I give up television, or Facebook or playing games on the internet during Lent, what do I do with the time I have saved, sleep longer or use my time for more prayer, spiritual reading or reaching out to others?

Are there some bad habits from which I should fast? Can I fast from judging someone and rather have more compassion for that person? Can I fast from greed and accumulating things and rather share my surpluses? St. Augustine says if I accumulate things I do not need, I am stealing from those who do need those things. Can I fast from gossip, and make it a point to affirm some people? Can I fast from noise (always have the television or radio on) and take advantage of some silence? Can I fast from holding grudges, and rather reach out for reconciliation or forgiveness? Jesus said if there is a rift with another, make peace with that person before coming to the Eucharist. Can I fast from sharing bad news when it is not necessary, and make a point to share good news?

Lent is a time to going back to "basic training," looking at the fundamentals of our faith, examining ourselves carefully and thoroughly. May we scrutinize ourselves concerning the place of the spirituality of fasting in our lives.

Have a great fourth week of Lent.
