## A word from Fr. Bill....

#### Dear Parishioners:

For many years now Rice Bowls have been traditionally a part of Lent. Because of our familiarity with them over the years, it is easy to forget their purpose. I thought it might be a good idea to refresh our memories about this Lenten tradition which is facilitated by the Catholic Relief Services (CRS).

CRS Rice Bowls share stories of hope from around the world. For example, CRS programs empower young mothers in Guatemala so that they can raise their families in their native land. CRS programs accompany refugees in their moment of greatest need and help equip them with tools to return home and rebuild. These are examples of the kinds of communities where the Lenten alms of participating Catholics from across our country are affecting lives.

It is through CRS Rice Bowls that faith communities in every diocese throughout the United States put its faith into action through prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. More than 130 million lives are touched by these donations. 75% of the donations through Rice Bowls support the work of CRS in roughly 45 different countries each year. 25 % of all donations to CRS Rice Bowls stay in the local diocese -- supporting the efforts of alleviating hunger and poverty. Here in the Archdiocese of Philadelphia, Rice Bowl donations are used by Catholic Charities to support its work locally to relieve hunger.

The CRS Rice Bowls provides daily opportunities to be inspired by the stories of communities from around the world, to set aside a little of ourselves to make room for a stranger. We do this during Lent because CRS Rice Bowls reminds us that the journey through the desert ultimately leads to resurrection -- and that it is our Gospel call to stand with courage, bringing the hope of the Resurrection to a world often beset by hopelessness. While the barren expanses of the desert tell us to be afraid, to cling to what we have and look out only for ourselves, the invitation of Lent beckons us forth to encounter the needs of the world through:

- A readiness to give alms so as to share what we have with our brothers and sisters around the world.
- A renewed life of prayer in God that unites our needs with the needs of the world, through the stories of members of our global human family.
- A commitment to fast that reminds us that God is ever faithful and frees us from the fear of not having or being enough.

This year's CRS Rice Bowl journey responds to Pope Francis' invitation to share the journey with migrants and refugees -- sharing stories from around the world that reflect our commitment to care for some of these most vulnerable members of our human family.


This Lent, as millions of God's children flee war, persecution, and poverty, I encourage you to share their journey, guided by the CRS Rice Bowl.

It is not too late to participate with other parishioners this Lent in Operation Rice Bowl. There are still Rice Bowls available in the back of the church. Money that you save from fasting from "whatever" (chocolate, beer, alcohol, munchies, etc.) can be placed in the bowls and returned to us at Easter time. Then we will send a check to Catholic Relief Services. It is more convenient for us if checks (made out to St Augustine Parish) or cash are placed in the bowls. Change, however, is always accepted.

This tradition of Rice Bowls has become very routine each Lent, I hope this explanation helps to remind us if its purpose and encourage us to participate in it.

#### Dear Parishioners:

As the result of group discussions last Lent and Advent on how we as a parish might respond to the drug and homeless problem in our society, we have now established a relationship with the Franciscan Outreach of the Padre Pio Prayer Center in Frankford. One of the important needs identified is the need for daily hygiene and food/personal items as well as clothing items to help the homeless get through the rough winter months.



Lent this year begins on Wednesday, March 6, 2019. During Lent, we are customarily asked to do three things (as a minimum), that of Prayer, Fasting and Alms Giving. We can do all three with the homeless and drug addicted in mind. First, let us offer daily prayer that God will provide for, comfort and help them to find support services. Secondly, through fasting, we can use the money that we would normally spend on food and drinks, to provide for the less fortunate. Finally, alms giving or sacrificial offerings. This year we are asking our parishioners to consider providing "Blessing Bags" that will be given to the homeless. Included on this flyer, you will see a picture and a list of suggested personal items that can be placed in a gallon-sized Ziploc bag and then they will be taken to the Padre Pio Prayer Center in Frankford and distributed to the homeless and drug addicted population in the Frankford and Kensington area of our city. These small personal items can help to restore the dignity of one's person as well as appearance.

There is also a need for some clothing items such as: gloves, warm hats, hoodies, white socks, underwear (men and women), pants, jeans, sweatpants and winter coats. We ask that underwear is new and socks can be slightly used. If you are able to provide the Blessing Bags or clothing, it can be dropped off in the large boxes in the rear of the church.
