

A word from Fr. Bíll...

Dear Parishioners:

This week we celebrate two very important days in our Church year: Monday, November 1st is All Saints Day, and Tuesday, November 2nd is All Souls' Day.

These days are important for us as we continue on our faith journey because they remind us of some very significant aspects of our faith.

First, All Saints Day reminds us that anyone in heaven is a saint. On Monday, we will especially remember those in heaven, including our own family members and friends, who have not been officially declared a saint by the Church.

Why do we honor Saints at all? There are some who criticize us as worshipping idols or false gods when we pray to Saints. There are two reasons Saints are important to us. One is we can be encouraged and edified by people who were in many ways ordinary people, but lived lives of faith in the midst of the regular and sometimes extreme difficulties of life. The second is we believe they can serve as intercessors for us as we pray to Saints to intercede for us to God.

We know there also are individuals who have been declared Saints by the Church. A good book to read about the Saints is "My Life With the Saints" by James Martin, SJ. Fr. Martin explains how different people who have lived before us (some recent and some not so recent) inspire him at different times, depending on what is going on in his life at that particular time.

For example, we can look at St. Augustine and be inspired by the fact that as he searched for happiness he made many mistakes, but by perseverance and humility he finally led a virtuous life. We can be inspired by St. Monica whose perseverance influenced her son, Augustine. Especially, those dealing with physical challenges can be inspired by Servant of God (in the process of beatification and sainthood) Fr. Bill Atkinson, OSA. For 41 years Fr. Bill was as a quadriplegic, paralyzed from the neck down as a result of a toboggan accident. During that time, he was a priest, religious, teacher, coach, chaplain and friend to many. You will find an interesting booklet describing his life in the back of the church. You are invited to take one.


All Saints Day is one of several Holy Days of Obligation. On years where certain Holy Days fall on a Monday the obligation to celebrate Mass is suspended. All Saints is one of those feasts and this year it falls on a Monday. Thus, as significant as All Saints Day is, it is not a Holy Day of Obligation this year.

All Souls' Day is a time for us to pray to God for those who have died but may not yet have arrived at being in total and full union with God. Karl Rahner, a German Jesuit theologian, asked the question, "Who among us when we die deserves to be totally with God." There is usually some purification that needs to take place. When someone dies, that person does not cease to be a member of the Church or a part of the Body of Christ. We have responsibilities to help those who are living to get to heaven, and we have responsibilities to help those who have died to get to heaven. At every Mass we pray for those who have died and often for a specific person. We also pray in our own personal prayer for those who have died. Starting on Tuesday, All Souls' Day, we will be remembering at Mass those enrolled in the All Souls' Novena which last for nine days. You will find envelopes in the back of the church on which you can write the names of individuals whom you would like to be remembered in these nine novena Masses.

Both All Saints Day and All Souls' Day reflect a great deal about our faith and who we are as members of the Church. May we celebrate these days well.
