Each Sunday, after the 11:00 AM Mass there is a novena in honor of the Santo Niño.



A word from Fr. Bill....

Dear Parishioners:

As you read this we will have returned, but I wanted to give you a small idea of our pilgrimage.

On Thursday, September 8 (The Birthday of the Blessed Mother) eight of us from St. Augustine Parish (Remedias Cargado, Alicia Manguba, Feme Whitzell, Lita Manguba, Amelia Manguba, Bel Lopena, Anthony Stewart-Gilkes and I) met at the Philadelphia International Airport for a pilgrimage to Paris and Rome. Please see our picture on the parish website (click on "History & Community" and then "220th Anniversary Celebrations"). Although we will return by the time you read this, I thought it might be interesting to share with you some of our experiences.

The air travel to Paris went very smoothly. After we were met by a representative of 206 Tours, we went to the Holy Cross Basilica. We met our extremely capable Tour Guide, Juan Carlos and 18 other people from all over the country who would join us for the next four days. Appropriately, we began our time together in France with Mass. I reminded all of us that this pilgrimage which we would share together was a reflection of our pilgrimage of life--that we travel it together, praying with each other, helping each other where needed, and sharing our insights to God with each other. You can find a picture of us overlooking all of Paris on the parish website.

After Mass on Friday, we traveled on a very comfortable bus (Mercedes-Benz) by way of the picturesque Loire Valley to Nevers where the incorrupt body of St. Bernadette is entombed. St. Bernadette (1844-1879) who grew up in Lourdes had 18 aspirations of the Blessed Mother before she began living community life in Nevers. To get an insight into her life you might want to see the movie The Song of Bernadette which will help you appreciate how she handled the challenges of those who did not believe her (including her parents and parish priest) and the challenges of many sicknesses, including asthma and tuberculous. On Saturday morning we celebrated Mass at the tomb of her incorrupt body in the convent in which she lived for 12 years.

After Mass on Saturday, we began our journey to Lisieux, the home of St. Thérèse, the Little Flower (1873-1897). On the way we passed the village near the city of Rouen where the elderly priest was murdered a month ago while celebrating Mass. After visiting the house in which Thérèse grew up (see picture on our website) we visited the Basilica erected in her honor and where her parents are entombed (see picture on our website). They were canonized saints less than a year ago (October, 2015) at the end of the Synod on the Family, the first couple in the history of the Church to be canonized as a couple. We then visited the Carmelite community where St. Thérèse was a cloistered sister, where she is entombed today and where 18 Carmelite sisters live community life today.

On Sunday, after celebrating Mass (6:30 AM) at the hotel, we traveled to Le Mont Saint Michael (Saint Michael Mountain) which has a beautiful French Village and has been a home to a monastic community for 12 centuries (see picture on our website). It was then a long drive with a lot of traffic to Paris and dinner.

On Monday, we celebrated Mass at the shrine of the Immaculate Conception near the crypt of St. Catherine Labouré (1806-1833) to whom Mary revealed how a medal should be developed which reflects the doctrine of the Immaculate Conception. We then took a sightseeing tour of Paris which included seeing where Napoleon is buried, the American Embassy, the Paris Campus of St. John University, the remains of St Vincent de Paul (the founder of the Vincentians who staff St. John University and the one for whom all of the St. Vincent de Paul Societies are named). We stopped at the Eiffel Tower which is still standing because it was the winner of a contest at a World's Fair in Paris (see picture on our website and my first attempt ever at a "selfie"). We stopped and toured the beautiful Notre Dame Cathedral (see picture on the parish website). We kept in mind those who were the victims from a terrorist's attack last month which took place about a mile from where we were. *Continued on page 1.....*
